

North Junior Baseball Season Opens Sunday

The North Burnaby Junior Baseball League will open its 1966 season on Sunday April 24th at 2 p.m., at Confederation Park. Reeve Allan Emmott and Parks and Recreation Committee Chairman Paul Seifner will attend the brief opening ceremony which will precede the opening games.

This year the "A" or 15 to 16 year old division will consist of four teams from Burnaby North, Capitol Hill, Text Phonians, Black Motors Glans, North Burnaby Lions and the Couquits, plus teams from Port Coquitlam and Central Burnaby. Along with playing their regular games these teams will also play inter-locking games with Whalley, Haney, Burnaby South,

Newton, Kennedy Heights and Ladner.

As last year, the "B" or 13 and 14 year old division will consist of the Eastern division made up of the Tigers, Athletics, Volkswagen and Yashoves, in the Western division they are Cardinals, Dodgers, Giants, Mets and Pirates.

The Eastern division games will be played at Kensington Junior High School and the Western division games will be played at Confederation Park under field.

This year the league will be under the experienced hand of president Dennis Dixon, who is hoping that this year will be even more successful than last year.

Pitch-and-Putters Swing Into Action by July 1

Burnaby pitch-and-putters can swing into action on the new Central Park course by July 1, municipal parks department officials have announced.

Burnaby's lush green 18-hole golf course will be par three on fairways ranging from 55 to 120 yards, and is expected to open for use in late June.

The Burnaby workmen now completing the clubhouse near Imperial at the south end of the park, as part of an \$85,000 project in conjunction with Vancouver. The project is one of several major ones planned for construction in the park during the next

five years.

Vancouver and Burnaby take five-year turns at the park. Vancouver is now in its second year of the current turn. Burnaby and Vancouver contribute \$50,000 each annually to complete the projects, which will cost about \$500,000 in total.

These include a regulation-size soccer field in the park's south west corner; a playground on the Patterson Avenue side near the Hydro tracks; a junior stadium; creation of two lakes in the centre of the park; and a children's zoo and miniature railway.

Council Halts Apartment Policy

Burnaby Councillors this week refused to rubber stamp the recommendations of Town Planner Tony Parr, to approve his complex apartment location studies, without serious debate on the matter.

Presented to Council as a fait accompli after generally favorable public comment in a series of four apartment study forums throughout Burnaby, the report was questioned initially by Councillor Dave Herd.

"I think it's a great plan, but there are a few points on which I can't agree," Herd pointed out.

"I can't see the wisdom of having first and second priorities in apartment location," he expanded.

"Once we pass the plan, it would be rather late in the day for us to change it," he stressed.

"You could table the motion, but people who have been waiting for re-zoning have been waiting a long time," observed Reeve Allan Emmott.

Planner Parr noted that some 60 applications are now on hand to be dealt with by Council in the next few weeks.

Councillor Emmott Caffery agreed on the delay.

"This is a very serious step," he stated, "We should delay this until next Monday's planning meeting."

Municipal Manager Harold Balfour, in presenting his recommendations following the public meeting, called upon Council to reconfirm its tentative endorsement of the plan as originally stated, and adopt the location plan formally as its policy guide for apartment development.

The plan would restrict high rise apartments to the Hastings Brentwood, Simpsons-Sears, Edmonds, and North Road centre areas.

High density, medium rise (8 or 9 storey) dwellings would be allowed near the high-rise towers, as well as at Westridge.

Medium density apartments (3 storeys) would be permitted in the area of the Burnaby General Hospital, Capitol Hill, Balnibrigie and Louisa, near Simon Fraser University, and Gilley-Kingsway areas, as well as on the limits of the higher-density areas.

Most uncertain, as yet, are development details for areas near the Loughheed Mall (North Road) centre, and the nearby future university residential area, on the west face of Burnaby Mountain, near the new golf course.

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Largest apartment scheme to be checked by approval of Town Planner Tony Parr's apartment location plan, would be the 258-unit, \$3.5 townhouse and garden apartment complex proposed for a north Burnaby location by Inter-continental Holdings.

The plan would see Burnaby's lowest-density multiple residential development built on a 16.88 acre site at the south-west corner of Parker and Holdom. Included would have been 60 two-bedroom units, 60 three-bedroom dwellings, and 138 townhouse units, with three bedrooms each.

Six reasons were listed in a report from Planner Parr, submitted to Council this week on the assumption that Council would pass the apartment policy recommendations, then proceed to individual proposals.

- The surrounding area is essentially single-family.
- The area has experienced a rapid growth in the building of new single-family homes in recent years, and the situation should not be altered.
- An approved plan for subdivision has already been prepared for parts of the surrounding land, and has been followed by all recent developers, including 64 new homes since January of 1964.
- Apartments would bring increased traffic into the area

Emmott Regrets Moody Ramp Row

A dispute between Port Moody and Burnaby council over a dog angle mistake in building the Port Moody boat launching ramp has simmered down after a statement by Reeve Allan Emmott that the verbal battle which has arisen over the situation is most regrettable.

Port Moody Mayor Al Howe has suggested a new ramp, with a steeper slope, be constructed adjacent to the existing one, which has only a 7-1/2% grade against the Boat Association's recommended 20% grade.

Burnaby Councillors Doug Drummond and Emmott Caffery made remarks about the ramp which Burnaby considered "quite unnecessary."

"I was also unhappy to see the statements which issued from Port Moody aldermen," said the reeve. "If there has been an error made at the ramp, I am sure it is not serious and that it will be corrected."

Burnaby and Port Moody are half-partners in building the facility, at a cost of \$80,000 in all. The facility was designed to serve residents of both Burnaby and Port Moody.
