Mike Ramberg, Legion's hard working inside right, scored what proved to be the winning goal five minutes after the opening whistle when he scored in the close range. Legion controlled most of the play throughout the game but failed to score again until the final two minutes.

Oppositionist Jack Perri, who was presented with the Bob Tyndal Memorial Trophy on Saturday afternoon, proved why he was chosen the Vancouver & District League's 1st Division "Most Valuable Player" when he took advantage of a mixup amongst the Victoria defence and cracked the ball into the open net.

These classes are particularly valuable for parents who are taking children on summer vacations. Many lives will be saved this year if more people know how to apply artificial respiration. More than a thousand Canadians lose their lives each year through drowning. Many more are asphyxiated by poison, gas, strangling, smoke, electric shock and other reasons. The more people who know how to apply artificial respiration, the more chance there is of saving the lives of these people.

In two hours, any person can learn to apply artificial respiration, and to meet this need, the Burnaby Branch, St. John Ambulance is prepared to conduct free classes for any group that is interested.

May 16 to 21 has been declared "Save a Life Week" by the St. John Ambulance all across Canada, when free classes will be held.

While such classes are not limited to this one week, it is hoped this will serve to emphasize the need for a more widespread knowledge of this proven life saving method.

Shopping Centre To Be Dedicated On May 12th.

The \$10,000,000 Brentwood shopping centre now under construction at Lougheed and Willingdon in Burnaby will be dedicated May 12th at 4 p.m.

Webb & Knapp (Canada) Limited, developers of the 30-acre project, will invite civic and business leaders of Greater Vancouver to attend the ceremony which will coincide with pouring of the concrete for the mall of the centre.

Design features of the centre, which will be the biggest of its kind so far in B.C., will be revealed for the first time at a reception in the Lougheed Hotel after the dedication ceremony.

A \$5,000 scale model of the Brentwood project will be the centre piece of a cross-section of Webb & Knapp developments across Canada.

These include the \$75,000,000 Place Ville Marie, Canada's Rockefeller Centre) in downtown Montreal, the 650-acre Lake City Industrial Park in Burnaby and other multi-million-dollar projects in London, Ontario, Toronto and Halifax.

The Brentwood shopping centre will have the T. Eaton Co., Loblaw Groceries Ltd., and the Bank of Montreal as principal tenants, and 40 other stores.

Eaton's will occupy a three-story department store for which the steel has now been erected. Loblaw's will be establishing their first grocery outlet in B.C. and it will be the biggest in their chain.

The project is scheduled to be completed by summer of 1961.
